What's New?

ASTS National Transplant Service Line

The ASTS National Transplant Service Line was presented at the ASTS Council Meeting in Boston. This new initiative is a national service to ATP providers to increase multidisciplinary management of out-of-region transplant patients in acute care. With the Council's support to move forward with this initiative, the ATP Committee will develop a database of contacts at each transplant center across the country. This directory will be composed of ATP professionals from different institutions across the United States and globally.

The committee created this initiative because it recognizes that transplantation is an evolving field. One frequent challenge is finding a contact person to obtain clinical updates and provide a history when your patients are hospitalized at another transplant center. This service will be available to all in the transplant community and will be in alignment with the Medicare PQRI program looking at quality outcomes.

We are asking for your help. Please provide us with a contact person for the various departments of transplant at your center and state what organs that individual manages/serves as a contact for. No patient information will be exchanged via this database; rather, this will serve as a resource of contacts for transplant centers across the country. Mentorship Program


